

A study by the U.S. Dept. of Transportation's Highway Statistics Division showed the average cost per mile for a car based in a suburban location ranged between 9.4 cents for a subcompact to 13.6 cents for a standard-sized car. Transportation standard. The new standard which becomes effective on January 1, 1974 is Safety Standard No. 125.

Fusees, liquid-burning emergency flares, and red electric lanterns may be used as supplementary warning devices; however, after January 1, 1974, the reflective triangles will be the only permissible type of warning devices without their own source of power, and commercial interstate carriers will have to phase out all other such warning devices such as red flags, red emergency reflectors and triangles which do not meet the standards of Safety Standard The new regulation does not No. 125. ban emergency devices that have selfcontained power sources.




Told in the Files

TRAFFIC "DIE-GEST"


M OTOR-VEHICLE deaths in November 1972 totaled 4,550, an increase of 1 per cent over the November 1971 total of 4,500. The highest total ever recorded for the month was 5,276 in November 1968.

Deaths for the first 11 months of 1972 totaled 51,520, an increase of 3 per cent over the 11-month figure for 1971 of 49,800, and surpassing the previous record high of 51,140 for the first 11 months of 1969. Deaths for the twelve month period ending November 1972 totaled 56,420.

Disabling injuries for the first 11 months of this year are estimated at slightly more than 1.8 million. These are injuries resulting in disability beyond the day of the accident, and do not include minor injuries which probably totaled as many more.

The cost of motor-vehicle accidents for the first 11 months of 1972 is estimated at about \$14.4 billion.




"Defensive Driver" is a title in which you can take pride.

A defensive driver is not timid or overcautious, but he is determined to take every reasonable precaution to prevent traffic mishaps -- over and above what the law requires him to do. He seeks to anticipate the errors of other drivers and to smooth out the snarls caused by their mistakes. He is prepared to make allowances for all conditions.

You may say that you have a big enough job looking out for yourself, handling your vehicle under extreme emergency and stress situations as the law and necessity prescribe, but to be a defensive driver you must "think bigger," extending your concern to the entire "big picture" in the traffic pattern. Defensive driving requires forethought. This is the only way we know of to take care of your own safety and also help others avoid the pain and damage their blunders might have caused. It means staying clear of hazardous situations, not getting involved in someone else's accidents. Isn't that what all defensive drivers want? Isn't that what you want?

ITHIN the very near future a statistic will occur that it would be much nicer if it did not. The two millionth person will be killed on the streets and highways of America.

The first victim was one H. H. Bliss who was run over on West 74th Street in New York on September 14, 1899. The two millionth will

probably remain unrecognized as such.

What is two million? How can you see it? It is all the spectators at all National League Football games over any three week period during the regular season. It is more than the population of Cleveland or St. Louis. It is about that of the metropolitan area of Washington, including the extensive Maryland and Virginia suburbs.

It is five times all those killed in action in all the U.S. wars of the Twentieth Century. It is, of course, many more than those killed in all our wars. If you could single file two million people steadily and briskly by some given point, it would take about a month and a half for them all to pass.

Well, that's it. We can't turn the grim march around. There is no way to give them back the years of their lives they might otherwise have had. Probably the only thing we can do is reflect a bit.

No one can calculate how much money and effort has been poured this century into the struggle to make things safer on the highways. Step by step, as we have improved their mechanical performance, we have built greater safety into our vehicles. Uncounted thousands have been involved in the effort to instruct, compel, or cajole our people to accomplish safer driving practices. Our highways now have more safety engineered into them than ever before. While the number of fatalities continues to increase, we take some small comfort in the fact that the rate at which they are happening is appearing to decrease. But the real question we are left with of course is this: Have we done enough?

How much is two million? A lot.

What have we done?

Enough?

BROADER ARREST POWER DUE

Free State Patrolmen

A bill before the State Legislature to give general criminal arrest authority to Wisconsin State Patrol officers should be enacted into law.

Under current law, state troopers are not legally authorized to make arrests even if they see crimes committed unless they are committed on highways or until the criminals are fleeing the scene or other law enforcement officers.

It makes little sense to restrict these officers, among the best trained in the country, to arrest power only in routine traffic cases.

In arguing for the bill, Transportation Secretary Norman Clapp said:

"By eliminating existing unrealistic arrest restrictions, the legislation would provide additional enforcement assistance resources at no added cost to local governments, help stem increasing crime rates, assist in reducing the response time on citizen calls for help, eliminate local liability and red tape in calls for assistance during times of emergency, and enhance the overall law enforcement image and the Wisconsin criminal justice system."


General police power for state troopers has long been opposed by



some county lawmen, who apparently fear that giving troopers more power will somehow diminish their own. Wisconsin can no longer afford such provincial jealousies.

The current system on the state level makes no more sense than taking away the arrest powers of county traffic officers, such as Dane County's, whose primary duties, like those of the state troopers, is and will remain traffic law enforcement.

As the crime rate continues to rise, the need is for more coordination of police agencies. The removal of this ridiculous restriction is long overdue.

How many people demanding more law and order know that Wisconsin sends it State Patrol officers out on the highway with one hand tied behind their backs?

State troopers are law enforcement officers only in a limited sense, mostly having to do with traffic violations. Citizens understandably are dismayed when a trooper refuses to act, or acts reluctantly, when a crime is committed at, for example, a roadside restaurant or gas station.

The explanation simply is that troopers have been given very limited criminal arrest authority. They may make nontraffic arrests only if on duty in uniform and under these circumstances: when someone is transporting a stolen motor vehicle; when a crime is being committed in a trooper's presence on the highway (he has no authority to stop a rape or other crime being committed just beyond the right of way); and when someone is fleeing a crime or fleeing a law officer (until a warrant is issued, after which "fleeing" no longer applies, the courts say). Thus if a driver stopped for a minor violation turns out to be a fugitive murderer, the trooper has no authority to arrest him for that, unless he is fleeing the scene of the crime.

The danger in this is not merely to the public, which pays for the inefficiency and goes unnecessarily unprotected. The danger also is to the individual trooper, who sometimes does make arrests outside his authority because of his confusion or feeling of moral obligation. Doing that can leave him open personally to a civil suit, as well as unprotected in certain circumstances by state insurance and hazard benefits.

Troopers have been hamstrung this way for years largely because of jealous rivalry from other law officials, especially county officers, who have blocked corrective legislation. Now, however, more and more responsible local and county officers have begun to recognize the seriousness of the situation. Even the Wisconsin Sheriffs and Deputy Sheriffs Association, which just this winter voted anew to oppose the change, is now reconsidering.

As Dodge County Sheriff Edwin Nehls, chairman of the association's legislative committee. recently wrote to members: "Maybe in the best interest of law enforcement, we should all pull together. As we all know, there is room for all of us."

BRAKES, HORNS, MUFFLERS & LIGHTS

The following was received from Tpr. Howard Kilday, which he found in the 1922 Motoring in Wisconsin:

(Sec. 85.09, 85.13)

Motor vehicles must be provided with efficient brakes, adequate bell or horn, and muffler. The use of sirens is limited to police, fire department cars, and hospital ambulances. The unnecessary use of a horn, or driving with the muffler open, in a city or village is prohibited.

During the period beginning thirty minutes after sundown and ending thirty minutes before sunrise, motor vehicles driven on highways must be provided with two headlights (white or tinted but not red) and one red tail light placed on the left side of the vehicle. The minimum requirements for headlights are that they must give a view 200 feet ahead and be so adjusted as to avoid dangerous glare. Standards for lighting are prescribed by the Industrial Commission and pamphlets containing same may be had on application.

The cost of Safety in new cars is increasing. The '73 autos will cost \$62.50 more in safety devices than the "72's. The 1974 models will increase by \$115 and by 1976 the increases for "safety"

will be \$295. Through the period 1968 to 1976, safety devices will have caused an increased cost of \$615 per vehicle -- which the consumer pays. Question: When the point of diminishing returns is realized -- by the sudden reduction in traffic deaths -- who is left with money enough to buy those safety packages?

- ●U.S. Supreme Court has upheld states rights to require motorcyclists to wear helmets. The ruling, based on the premis that no person has a right to subject himself to injury or death, involved the facts that from the moment of injury, society picks the person up off the highway, delivers him to a municipal hospital and municipal doctors, and if he sustains permanent injuries, then he becomes a ward of the state.
- Pirkle Refrigerated Lines of Madison discriminated against a woman truck driver by not allowing her to make cross-country runs with another drivera male, not her husband - according to Dept. of Industry, Labor & Human Rela-The carrier terminated its lease with Elaine Lyon of Oostburg after she made a haul to the west coast with another man. Pirkle argued that permitting this practice would possibly lead to improper conduct. DILHR ordered the lease reinstated because, it stated, that Pirkle's"legitimate concern is not with the morality of its drivers, but with safe and efficient transportation of freight".
- Milwaukee Journal has this to say about our grab for peace officer authority:


"The Wisconsin Sheriffs and Deputy Sheriffs Association, while commendably urging a stronger drunk driving law, sticks to its hostoric professional jealousy of the State Patrol. Rather than continuing opposition to a stronger patrol, these county officers should get over their hangup and join this needed law and order move."

1972 Nat'l. Summary of Officers
Killed--A report received from the
FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Section
indicates that 112 law enforcement
officers were killed within the
United States due to felonious
criminal action during 1972. This
compares with a total of 126 officers slain in 1971. Regionally,
57 officers were slain in the
Southern States, 30 in the North
Central States, 14 officers in the
Northeastern States, and 11 in the
Western States.

Ambush-type attacks claimed the lives of 14 law enforcement officers during 1972: 3 in January, 4 in April, 2 in August (1 was Wisconsin's only officer killed), l in October, 3 in November, and 1 in December. Twenty-five officers were killed in connection with robbery matters, 24 while attempting arrests for crimes other than robbery and burglary, 15 in connection with disturbance calls, 14 making traffic stops, 9 while answering burglary matters, 5 investigating suspicious persons or circumstances, 2 in connection with a civil disorder, 2 by mentally deranged persons, and 2 met death at the hands of prisoners.

One hundred eight of the 112 officers slain in 1972 were killed through the use of firearms, 75 of which specifically involved handguns. The latest reports available indicate that law enforcement agencies have solved 101 of the 112 murders.






