We are approaching our goal of 60 percent of first responders trained in Wisconsin. As of February 2024, we are at 57.3 percent and growing. We wanted to thank those dedicated volunteer TIM instructors for their commitment to the program and encourage first responder agencies to schedule TIM classes. New EV Hybrid Stickers for First Responder Safety are Ready for Wisconsin License Plates



The Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) will begin sending new EV Hybrid stickers to current owners of electric and hybrid vehicles, as required by recent legislation.



The new law requires that the orange and black "EV Hybrid" stickers be attached to each license plate issued for an electric or hybrid vehicle. Wisconsin had nearly 146,000 electric and hybrid vehicles on the road in 2023.

This <u>Wisconsin law</u> was passed in 2023 for the safety of first responders when dealing with electric powered vehicles in emergency situations. First responders will be able to quickly identify the vehicle as having electric components by the orange and black "EV Hybrid" sticker.

All current owners of electric or hybrid vehicles with valid registration will automatically be sent their EV Hybrid sticker(s) and should receive their sticker(s) by June. Starting this summer, those who apply for title and registration for a new electric or hybrid vehicle (including those purchased at a dealership) will be provided a sticker(s) with their new plate(s). Anyone who purchases an electric or hybrid vehicle ahead of that time will receive their sticker by mail. There is no need to contact the DMV for EV Hybrid stickers.

Sticker placement

For standard-sized license plates (auto, light truck, etc.): the sticker should be attached to the upper right corner of each plate, just to the RIGHT of the bolt holes.

Train-the-Trainer Courses

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation's (WisDOT) Traffic Incident Management Enhancement (TIME) program is once again looking for new Traffic Incident Management (TIM) instructors.

Do you believe the proper application of TIM principles at an incident scene makes all responders safer? Do you believe that TIM principles result in the quicker clearance of an incident? Do you want to teach your fellow responders these valuable tools? Then the TIME program would like you to join their ranks of instructors. The program currently has 143 TIME-trained instructors from every region of the state, but we can always use more – the more diverse the instructor pool, the better the training for the responders.

The requirements for becoming and remaining a TIME program instructor are:

- 1) You must attend the eight-hour FHWA "Train-the-Trainer" instructor program.
- 2) You are asked to teach at least one four-hour responder class annually (to remain current with the material).

All TIM instructors are 100 percent volunteers. The program does not have any funds available to compensate instructors for their time or travel. They're passionate about incident scene safety and want to share their knowledge and experience with fellow responders. We try to have two instructors from different disciplines at each four-hour class, with one having the discipline from the requesting agency.

Train-the-Trainer courses will be held on the following dates:

Saturday, May 11, 2024, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Vilas County Courthouse, located at 330 Court Street, Eagle River, WI 54521. Please submit an <u>application</u> to attend the training by April 29, 2024.

Saturday, October 26, 2024, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Traffic Management Center, located at 433 W. St. Paul Avenue, Suite 300, Milwaukee, WI 53203. Please submit an application to attend the training by October 14, 2024.

The training is free, and the TIME program will provide lunch and all teaching materials. Please consider becoming a TIM instructor. It can be very rewarding!
