


# **Driving an RCUT intersection** without extended turn lanes



Restricted Crossing U-Turn intersections, or RCUTs, are designed to **simplify a driver's focus to** one direction of traffic at a time.

RCUT intersections (sometimes called a J-turn) are proven to significantly reduce fatal and serious injury crashes.

#### How to drive an RCUT:

- **1.** From the side road, look left for a safe gap in traffic. Turn right from the side road into the right lane of the main highway, increasing your speed as you merge.
- **2.** Look for a safe gap in the left lane of the main highway, signal and change lanes.
- **3.** As you approach the left-turn lane, signal left and enter the turn lane.
- **4.** Stop or yield as indicated before completing your turn. Look to your right for a safe gap in traffic. Turn left and enter the left lane of the main highway, increasing your speed as you merge.
- **5.** Look for a safe gap in the right lane of the main highway, signal and change lanes.
- **6.** Continue straight on the main highway or turn right onto the side road depending on your destination.

### Some rules to remember at RCUT intersections

- » Always look for safe gaps in oncoming traffic before entering or changing lanes.
- » By law, turn into the nearest lane as practical, except where signs or pavement markings direct the driver to turn into a specific lane.\*
- » Always use your turn signal to indicate your intention. Watch for directional signs to help you navigate.
