- Mobile barrier truck discussion Counties visit Illinois DOT, can help improve worker operations and safety, reduce installation time for operations, enormous safety benefits, separate traffic from the workers

 - 1. Experiment moving from 4" to 6" pavement markings
- v. Speed Management Variable speed limits, how to reduce speeds in work zones, how to effectively set the speed limits.

 - 1. Geofencing, make drivers more aware of construction projects not just large scale projects, awareness in the work zone, coordination with news agencies for spreading the word about work zone safety, social media platforms, etc.

 - 1. Need to determine issues to be addressed
 - 2. Need to determine best way to get the word out to the correct people
- d. Legislation and Statute Changes Elise Nelson
 - i. Met once
 - ii. New Bills being introduced:
 - 1. 30 minutes of curriculum for drivers ed, making its way through the legislature, SB 591/AB629, hearing December 5, 2023
 - 2. Use of Cameras in Work Zones for assistance in the event incidents occur in work zones, SB 614/AB651 (not for speed enforcement)
 - iii. Future discussion:
 - Flagger Law similar law to the school bus law to allow flaggers to report drivers who do not obey the stop/slow paddle
 - 2. Automated Speed Enforcement/Speed Safety Cameras

- iv. Working on getting updates to drivers ed curriculum
 - 1. <u>www.workzonesafe.com</u> has online course for work zone safety
 - a. Is state specific, working with the person who developed the course in Oklahoma to develop a WI specific course
 - b. Has drawings for scholarships for students who complete the class, up to \$500.
 - c. 40-50 min course for students
- e. Temporary Traffic Control Josh Skarsten
 - i. 2 meetings so far
 - ii. Splitting into smaller groups since the group is so large
 - *iii.* 35 *ideas from the kick off meeting and asked members to vote for their 3 top priorities to focus on*
 - iv. 2nd meeting top 3 objectives
 - 1. Bike and Ped
 - 2. Traffic control design improved worker protection
 - 3. Ways to minimize traffic flow through work zones, duration, direct traffic around work zones
 - v. Next Meeting: December/January
- f. Law Enforcement and Speeds Marquis Young/Lt Edward Witkiewicz
 - i. Met once.
 - ii. Looking at crash data for higher crash rate locations
 - iii. Crashes are not always documented accurately in work zones, so plan to take a closer look.
 - iv. 20 different discussion items during the first meeting
 - v. Breaking it up to different speed types into 4 categories
 - 1. Speeding within work zones
 - 2. Behavior
 - 3. Law enforcement
 - 4. Research and outreach
 - vi. Look at each one of those areas to see how we can impact/reduce crashes
 - vii. Some legislative, enforcement in work zones

- viii. Looking at law enforcement practices in work zones what does that look like in work zones
- ix. Analyzing and reviewing crash data
- *x.* May meet quarterly can increase frequency based on needs of the group



2. How frequently should the Work Zone Safety Task Force meet?







 - Working on updates for real-time inclusion
 - Local Road Pilot (SMART Grant)
- Connected Devices arrow boards and location markers Pilot 2024
- Pedestrian Audible Devices Pilot 2024
- Driveway Assistance Devices Pilot 2024



Traffic Control Updates

- Temporary Rumble Strips for lane closures, lane shifts, new stop conditions, crossovers, lane shifts.
- One arrow board requirement in 2025



Enforcement Update
